The City met with the following Neighborhood Associations who participated in the development of this document: Maplewood, Rose Village, Central Park, Harney Heights and Fourth Plain Village. This document outlines concerned voices by the Neighborhood Associations regarding the Day Center Program operations and the City's commitment to address them. The City is committed to maintaining a welcoming building with programs and services that are responsive to the needs of the community.

The code of conduct for participants should expand to the behavior in the neighborhood and not just the Day Center	 SHARE will have each visitor to the Day Center Program sign a Code of Conduct. The guidelines in this document will include, but not be limited to, information on smoking, safety, posturing, substance use and trash. The guidelines will be posted throughout the Day Center Program area.
Discourage loitering	 The Vancouver Police Department will continue to enforce the City ordinance that prohibits the blocking of sidewalks as well as any type of trespassing per Vancouver Municipal Code (VMC) 8.18. The Day Center Program will include storage facilities available to participants which should help to reduce storage of personal property in public spaces.

The City will work with assigned City staff neighborhood liaisons to gather information and address concerns discussed at neighborhood meetings.

Provide education and training to Neighborhood Associations on: understanding mental illness, what is considered an emergency, and various issues related to homelessness (i.e. camping ordinance)	 City staff will schedule for trainings on-site at the Vancouver Navigation Center for neighborhood members. Neighborhood Associations can also request trainings/presentations at their neighborhood meetings. City will include discussion regarding any public investments (i.e. lights, pavement) made in the neighborhood.
Provide training to Neighborhood Associations on: MyVancouver App reporting features	 Non-emergency issues can be reported through the MyVancouver App including potholes, graffiti, sign damage, and street lights issues. City staff can provide trainings on-site at the Vancouver Navigation Center for neighborhood members. Neighborhood Associations can also request training/presentations at their neighborhood meetings.

Conceal graffiti within 48 hours	The City will make every effort to keep the building and grounds free of graffiti. Research park furniture for surrounding parks	City staff are working to determine options for furniture at Waterworks and Evergreen Parks.

Install security cameras on building	City Staff are researching equipment that will be installed when building is in operation.
Security presence when the day center is open	Security personnel will be on-site during operating hours.
Install sprinkler system	Sprinkler systems are installed and will be maintained by the City.
No camping on site	 No camping signs will be posted across the site. The Vancouver Police Department will continue to respond to any complaints of unlawful camping per VMC 8.22, as staffing resources allow. Decrease the speed limit on Grand Boulevard to 25 or 20 miles per hour Research radar smart to be able to control speed limits	 Grand Blvd. is classified principal arterial. Principal arterials are designed to carry large volumes of traffic over long distances, so decreasing the speed limit could have negative impacts to the entire city transportation system. In this area of Grand Blvd, some design modifications have been made to promote a safer street for vehicles, cyclists and pedestrians.
	 The City will install semi-permanent Speed Monitoring Awareness Radar signs on Grand Boulevard in September 2018. City staff will attend Neighborhood Association meetings to provide information on transportation issues in this area.
Provide information about neighborhood traffic calming program and grants	 Information on the traffic calming program and grants will be provided at Neighborhood Association meetings. Sexual harassment behaviors will be reported	 A Code of Conduct must be adhered to by all Day Center Program users [Code of Conduct attached]. City staff will work with SHARE to determine incident reporting process and criteria for follow up. City will hold quarterly meetings with SHARE to discuss the operations and any impacts to the surrounding area.
Have after hours security	City will use a contracted security company for monitoring the site after hours. Any emergencies should be reported to 911.
Neighborhood police officer on site	 An office will be available inside the <i>Vancouver Navigation Center</i> to enhance police presence and contribute towards a community policing model. The assigned Neighborhood Police Officer will address livability and crime concerns in coordination with the assigned police patrols as

STREETS & LIGHTING

Maintain a well-lighted facility and grounds	The City will work with VPD to assess the property using Crime Prevention through Environmental Design (CPTED) strategies.
Respond to problems with street lighting	 The City will replace existing street light fixtures with new 200-watt LED fixtures along E. 20th Street on Y Street and Z Street, improving lighting and energy efficiency. The City will complete a lighting analysis of the neighborhood, as well as areas along Fourth Plain Boulevard between Ft. Vancouver Way and Grand Boulevard, to identify any areas that require additional lighting. Additional lighting fixtures as identified in the analysis would likely be deployed in the 1st or 2nd quarter of 2018. The lighting to be installed will not be so bright that it negatively impacts neighboring properties.

TRASH & RECYCLING

Prohibit and actively discourage littering around the site and surrounding properties and garbage cans should be placed at the Day Center's door	 There will be trash containers conveniently located inside and outside the Vancouver Navigation Center building. SHARE staff will monitor containers. SHARE will also monitor loitering throughout the Day Center Program area. Signage stating policy and code of conduct regarding littering will be installed and easily visible to all Day Center Program users. Training for Day Center Program users will be provided surrounding the impact of trash and negative behaviors. Talkin' Trash team will monitor the site for trash and belongings.
Expand Talking Trash program to neighborhood streets, not just around the Day Center	 Public Works will offer assistance with collection of litter from the right of way through the Talkin' Trash program. In addition, to surrounding streets, the area around the Vancouver Navigation Center will become a regular route for the Talkin' Trash team of three crew members and one supervisor working five days per week. The Day Center's trash area should be inside the fence	 The trash and recycling storage will be inside the property's fence. Containers will be screened and not accessible after operating hours (when the facility is closed) to help mitigate any unauthorized use of containers.
