I want to share an unsolicited comment from a local and distinguished judge who I have worked with in the past and has appeared before me often:

"When we were prosecutors together, you were the hardest working attorney in the office, and one of the most successful.

In the various times I have appeared in front of you, you have always been fair, just, well informed, highly ethical, and conscientious. I believe that despite the unfortunate publication of comments which were intended to be confidential, you are excellent judge and your contributions to the courts and the community are innumerable."

Numerous other community leaders have told me similar things and suggest I should keep on doing my job as a judge. Easy for them to say not knowing all the ramifications. I do not intend to jeopardize anyone's safety including my own.

I will continue my efforts to expand that throughout the county. So, in short there is lots of work to do to make Clark County a better and safer place. Including the launching of the first mental health arrest diversion program in the state here in Clark County.
